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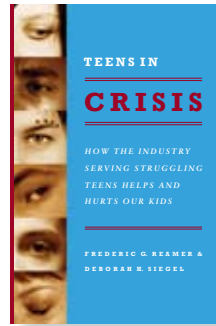

Achieving Permanence for Older Children and Youth in Foster Care

Edited by Benjamin Kerman, Madelyn Freundlich, and Anthony Maluccio

Through a novel integration of child welfare data, policy analysis, and evidence-informed youth permanency practice, this text recommends how to achieve and sustain family permanence for older children and youth in foster care. Researchers examine what is known about permanency outcomes for youth in foster care, how the knowledge base can be applied to improve these outcomes, and the directions that future research should take to strengthen youth permanence practice and policy. Part 1 examines child welfare data and discusses their implications for practice and policy regarding reunification, adoption, and relative custody and guardianship for youth in foster care. Part 2 addresses law, regulation, court reform, and resource allocation as vital components in achieving and sustaining family permanence. Contributors propose new policy directions and examine the impact of policy change created by court reform. Part 3 outlines a range of practices designed to achieve family permanence preserving families through community-based services, reunification, adoption, and custody and guardianship arrangements with relatives.

They compare empirical data from several emerging family types (single, co-parent, gay and lesbian, among others) to studies of traditional nuclear families, and they consider the effect of public policy and recent economic developments on the practice of marriage and the stabilization—or destabilization—of family. By approaching this topic from a variety of perspectives—historical, cross-cultural, gendered, demographic, sociobiological, and social-psychological—the editors highlight the complexity of the modern American family and the growing indeterminacy of its boundaries. Refusing to adhere to only one position, the editors provide an unbiased account of contemporary marriage and the makeup of the family.

Service providers are increasingly called upon to serve clients at home, a setting even a seasoned professional can find difficult to negotiate. From monitoring the health of older populations to managing paroled offenders, preventing child abuse, and reunifying families, home-based services require models that ensure positive outcomes and address the ethical dilemmas that might arise in such a sensitive context.

The contributors to this volume are national experts in diverse fields of social work practice, policy, and research. Treating the home as an ecological setting that guides human development and family interaction, they present rationales for and overviews of evidence-based models across an array of populations and fields of practice. Section one provides historical background and contemporary applications for home-based services. It also highlights ethical, administrative, and supervision issues unique to agencies that provide home-based services and summarizes the social policies that shape service delivery. Section two addresses home-based practice in such fields as child and adult mental health, school social work, and hospice care, detailing the particular population being treated, the policy and agency context, theories and empirical data, and practice guidelines. In section three, the editors present a unifying framework and suggest future directions for home-based social work.

Social workers today encounter competing claims concerning the needs and rights of children and youth while facing new dilemmas regarding policy and practice. 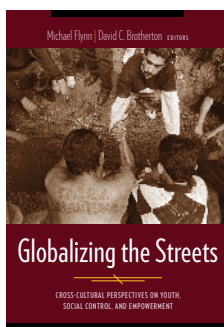

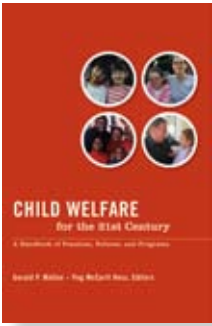

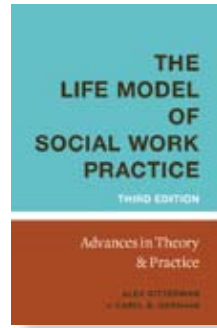

The book presents the “what” (theories and concepts) and the “how” (practice methods) to help people with their life stressors and, simultaneously, to influence communities, organizations, and policymakers to be more responsive to them. In this edition, Gitterman and Germain examine major changes to our socioeconomic and political landscape. They restore a chapter on the history of social work practice, offering a view of the limited services for African Americans provided by settlements and charity organization societies. The chapter also addresses the impact of contemporary societal trends, including the global economy, immigration, cultural changes, and the technology revolution. In addition, it discusses current professional contexts of managed mental health care, evidence-based practice, and the professional uses of technology.

Relational theory, or the idea that interactions with family members, friends, coworkers, and mental health practitioners shape human development and mental health, forms the foundation of a genuine, empathetic clinical relationship. Relational theory's emphasis on subjective experience might seem to contradict the classic views of Freudian ego psychology, which argues that desire is innately organized and changes throughout the life cycle, but as the editors of this volume show, psychoanalytical theory has contributed immensely to developing the relational perspective. After an overview of the key concepts that comprise relational theory today, this collection illustrates the main components of relational thinking that reflect a psychodynamic approach. 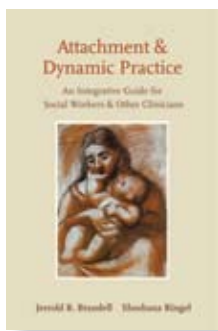

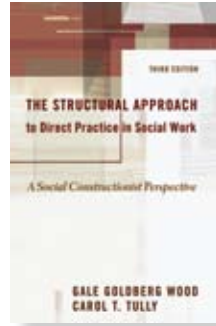

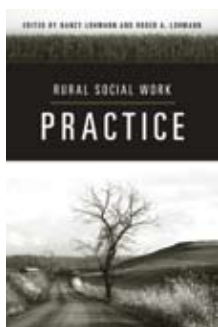

Psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers, psychiatric nurses, theoreticians, practitioners, and other allied professionals who together represent the entire arc of the mental-health field must be versed in psychopathology, the study of mental and emotional phenomena, abnormal psychology, and specific symptoms and behaviors. To this end, Henry Kellerman has assembled the first dictionary to focus exclusively on the subject of psychopathology, featuring more than two thousand entries (more than fifteen hundred primary and more than five hundred subentries) on specific symptoms and disorders, general syndromes, facets of personality structure, and diagnosis, as well as sampling benchmark contributions by theoreticians and researchers covering the history of psychopathology. These contributions encompass many of the theoretical and practice orientations within the field of mental health. The relatively new field of neuropsychanalysis is also represented.

Monitored by a distinguished editorial board, *Dictionary of Psychopathology* mostly adheres to the latest DSM nomenclature, yet Kellerman also retains useful residual diagnoses of previous DSM formulations. Thus, *Dictionary of Psychopathology* is constructed as a product that can broadly contribute to the synthesis of psychopathology.

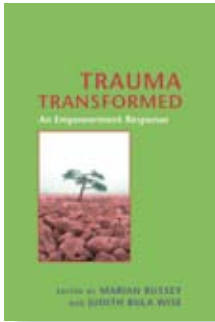
Interacting with involuntary clients is becoming more and more a part of every social worker's daily routine. First published in 1992, this textbook guides social workers in working with involuntary clients, individuals who are required to see a professional (such as juveniles on probation) or pressured to seek help (such as alcoholics threatened with the desertion of a spouse). Guidelines in this book suggest effective legal and ethical interventions that lead to more cooperative encounters, successful contracts, and less burnout on both sides of the treatment relationship. Ronald H. Rooney presents an honest analysis of the involuntary transaction and suggests ways to act within it.

For this second edition, Rooney has asked experts to contribute chapters on oppressed populations (the group most often mandated into treatment), solution-focused methods, and motivational interviewing—a promising new technique. Rooney also adds practical examples and questions to each chapter to better facilitate the involvement of students and readers.

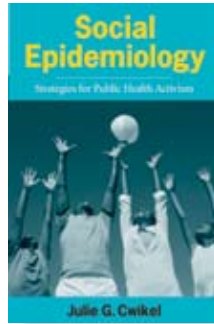

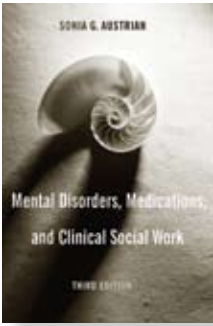

The incidence of substance abuse among lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals is estimated to be twenty-five percent higher than that of the general population. Internalized homophobia, alienation, poor support structures, and high levels of depression are believed to contribute to this statistic, with social activity at bars and clubs reinforcing addictive behavior. The threat of heterosexual bias in treatment programs also prevents many from seeking help. Human service professionals who work with LGBT clients are in dire need of a resource that offers the latest research on these unique issues. In this volume, Sandra Anderson examines both state of the art practices in treating substance use disorders and the most up-to-date analyses of sexual orientation and gender identity issues, heterosexism, and the ethical challenges of working with members of the LGBT community. She discusses practice with individuals, couples, families, and small groups, as well as practice at the program level. 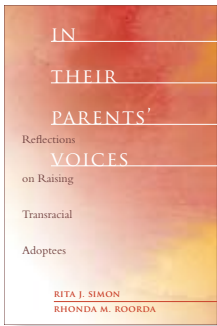
In Their Siblings' Voices shares the stories of twenty white non-adopted siblings who grew up with black or biracial brothers and sisters in the late 1960s and 1970s. Belonging to the same families profiled in Rita J. Simon and Rhonda M. Roorda's *In Their Own Voices: Transracial Adoptees Tell Their Stories* and *In Their Parents' Voices: Reflections on Raising Transracial Adoptees*, these siblings offer their perspectives on the multiracial adoption experience, which, for them, played out against the backdrop of two tumultuous, politically charged decades.

Simon and Roorda enhance their interviews with data and literature on transracial adoption during this period. They explore whether social work professionals and adoption agencies adequately trained these children regarding the challenges of blended families, and they ask if, after more than thirty years, race still matters to these brothers and sisters. In reevaluating their experiences, participants shed vital insight onto the challenges and triumphs of transracial adoption, and they provide new perspectives on the meaning of race and identity in such an intimate context. Few other books cover both the academic and the human dimensions of this issue. *In Their Siblings' Voices* enables readers to fully grasp the dynamic of living in a multiracial household and its affect on friends, school, and community.

Keeping Out the Other

A Critical Introduction to Immigration Enforcement Today

This timely anthology provides a history and analysis of recent immigration enforcement in the United States, demonstrating that our current anti-immigration tendencies are not a knee-jerk reaction to the events of September 11. Rather, they have been gathering steam for decades. With contributions from social scientists, policy analysts, legal experts, community organizers, and journalists, the volume critically examines the discourse that has framed the question of immigration enforcement for the general public. It also explores the politics and practice of deportation, new forms of immigrant profiling, relevant case law, and antiterrorist operations. Some contributors couch their critiques in an appeal to constitutional law and the defense of civil liberties. Others draw on the theories of structural inequality and institutional discrimination. These diverse perspectives stimulate new ways of thinking about the issue of immigration enforcement, proving that “security” has more to do with improving legal rights, social mobility, and the well-being of all U.S. residents than keeping out the “other.”

Justice as Prevention

Vetting Public Employees in Transitional Societies

Alexander Mayer-Rieckh and Pablo de Greiff

Countries emerging from armed conflict or authoritarian rule face difficult questions about what to do with public employees who perpetrated past human rights abuses and the institutional structures that allowed such abuses to happen. *Justice as Prevention: Vetting Public Employees in Transitional Societies* examines the transitional reform known as “vetting”—the process by which abusive or corrupt employees are excluded from public office. More than a means of punishing individuals, vetting represents an important transitional justice measure aimed at reforming institutions and preventing the recurrence of abuses. The book is the culmination of a multiyear project headed by the International Center for Transitional Justice that included human rights lawyers, experts on police and judicial reform, and scholars of transitional justice and reconciliation. It features case studies of Argentina, Bosnia and Herzegovina, the Czech Republic, El Salvador, the former German Democratic Republic, Greece, Hungary, Poland, and South Africa, as well as chapters on due process, information management, and intersections between other institutional reforms.

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What Happened to the Women? Gender and Reparations for Human Rights Violations

Ruth Rubio-Marín

What happens to women whose lives are affected by human rights violations? What happens to their testimony in court or in front of a truth commission? Women face a double marginalization under authoritarian regimes and during and after violent conflicts. Yet reparations programs are rarely designed to address the needs of women victims. *What Happened to the Women?* emphasizes the necessity of a gender dimension in reparations programs to improve the handling of female victims and their families. A joint project of the International Center for Transitional Justice and Canada's International Development Research Centre, this volume includes studies of gender and reparations policies in Guatemala, Peru, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, South Africa, and Timor-Leste. Contributors represent a wide range of fields related to transitional justice and include international human rights lawyers, members of truth and reconciliation commissions, and NGO representatives.

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Programs to Reduce Teen Dating Violence and Sexual Assault Perspective on What Works

Arlene Weisz and Beverly Black

Interviewing practitioners from more than fifty dating violence and sexual assault programs across the United States, Arlene Weisz and Beverly Black provide a unique resource for effective teen dating violence prevention. Combining the shared wisdom of the nation's vibrant prevention community with existing research, Weisz and Black use practitioners' own words to describe program goals and content, recruitment strategies, membership, structure, and community involvement. They find that multi-session programs are the most useful, since they enable participants to learn new behaviors and change entrenched attitudes. They also suggest combining single and mixed-gender sessions and encouraging discussions that resist blame.

Weisz and Black find that theories about the causes of violence should guide program development and that peer education and youth leadership empower participants and make programs more relevant. They show that effective education remains sensitive to cultural differences and sexual orientation and includes experiential exercises and role-playing. Most programs employ manuals in organizing discussions with youths and protect teens from irretrievable public revelations about their own victimization. Above all, the book emphasizes paying prevention educators enough to keep them working after they have become truly expert in prevention programming, and it encourages programs to self-evaluate and stay vital through new interventions.

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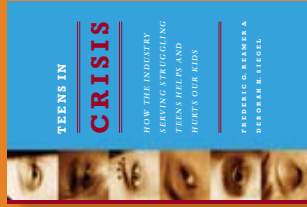
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
